

## How can we use assessment for learning to help pupils become independent learners?

The Learning How to Learn project showed how few teachers (20%) implemented AfL practices in ways that promoted independent learning by pupils. Teachers who were successful at promoting independent learning gave pupils activities that offered them scope to think for themselves and ensured the activities built cumulatively. The project gave the example of a teacher (Tracey) who inadvertently constrained her pupils' learning through giving them tightly controlled activities that were limited in scope and provided little opportunity for discussion. First, she asked her pupils to correct a piece of writing which was full of spelling and punctuation errors. Then she asked them to correct the technical errors in each other's work. The classroom dialogue involved pupils volunteering mistakes they had found and the corrections they had made. Tracey's lesson restricted pupils' understanding of what quality might look like because it focused on features that were simply right or wrong, rather than focusing on higher order concepts such as style and effect.

## Your evidence

You might find it helpful to explore the nature of the assessment for learning activities you organise for two or three of your classes. You could use it to help you reflect about how much scope they offer for pupils to think for themselves.
